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COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Today, you have many messages that invite you to action, from a spark of politics to broad social change movements dismantling structures of oppression. You work in contexts ranging from the tried and true to the emergent. You seek a more peaceful and just society, yet to find an effective way to contribute can be baffling as the ground shifts constantly, sometimes abruptly. You want to focus your efforts, but where? What is the nature of new dialogues that will challenge you and your assumptions? How can you ensure privilege is used as a bridge to insight and action, rather than a blinder or barrier? What is the nature of new dialogues that will challenge you and your assumptions? How do you get and stay unstuck? Ultimately, what does nonviolent resistance look like when oppression is global, virtual, and constantly evolving?

These are the questions you must answer as you find your own way forward in times of strife and uncertainty. They are the questions we will address in this program.

The program draws from the emerging theory and practice of human systems dynamics. It is taught by a team of scholar practitioners, including the founder of the field, Dr. Glenda Eoyang. The concepts and skills you learn are based in the theory of complexity science and grounded in real-world, pragmatic practice. COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES:

In this program, you will:

- Learn about dynamics that drive complex change in human systems
- Recognize and understand patterns of oppression that affect you and others
- Analyze and respond to oppression creatively and effectively
- Practice models and methods to find opportunity in complex challenges

By the end of the program, you will have:

- Focused on one situation of oppression that is significant to you in your life or work
- Shared the stories of people who see overcoming oppression as their life's work
- Used a simple inquiry process to see, understand, and influence oppression when it emerges
- Planned a "next wise action" that will shift the patterns of oppression and open new, unpredictable opportunities.
- Begun a life-long practice of Pattern Spotting, inquiry, and Adaptive Action

Through short lectures, group discussions, Adaptive Action experiments, and case studies, you will practice what you learn and prepare yourself to engage in nonviolent resistance.

SPI ATTENDANCE POLICY:

No participant can register for a course if they know they must miss more than two days of the course. SPI certificates are provided to participants only if they miss no more than one class day.
